From the Pastor:

Greetings!

My sabbatical is almost over and I will be returning to the office on Tuesday, September 5, and to the pulpit of Greenville Baptist Church on Sunday the 10th. I look forward to seeing my church family!

I would once again like to thank the congregation for allowing me this opportunity to achieve my sabbatical theme to Revive, Renew, and Rejoice. It has been physically, spiritually and emotionally beneficial for me over the past three months to have had Sabbath rest from my pastoral duties. On the Rhythms of the Spirit retreat that I attended in August, I talked with two pastors about their recent sabbatical experiences and another pastor who is currently in the planning stages for his sabbatical next Spring. We all agreed that the blessing is not just for the pastor, but for the congregation, when the pastor returns rested and with a fresh perspective on his or her life and ministry.

For the three Sundays in September that I will be preaching, I will share some of my sabbatical learnings that I believe will be helpful for all to contemplate. The sermon series will be entitled, "The Three R's: Reading, Righting and Relationship." It wasn't really planned that both my sabbatical theme and returning series would be 3 R's, but it was what God put upon my heart to share upon my return to the pulpit.

During the recovery period from my foot surgery, especially the 3 ½ weeks that I was on crutches, I was basically house bound, unless someone was with me to go out. I was not able to put any weight on my left foot at that time, which made stairs – especially going up – a real challenge. However, I made the best of that time as I was able to read quite a bit – books, blogs, etc. I also was able to catch up on many of the podcasts that I subscribe to on ministry issues, biblical teachings, shifting cultural and political dynamics, and a variety of other subjects that impact the world of the Christian believer and leader. I took many notes for my own reflection, and to share in various ways at church as well as for sermon ideas.

Perhaps the most rewarding aspect of the sabbatical period was being able to visit with family and friends, especially those out of state. I was able to organize a few gatherings to get friends from varying states to come together – many of whom had not seen each other in many years. Jim and I had lunch with two friends – a married couple that lives in southern New Jersey – which we had not seen in 27 years! The lunch lasted three hours. Luckily, the waitress was in no rush to have us leave.

We also had precious time with some of Jim's family in New York and some of my family in New Jersey. Even though many of us keep in touch via Facebook, having face to face conversation and getting all those hugs and kisses was heartwarming.

Jim and I will have much to share with you upon our return. See you in September!

FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The re-glazing, priming, and painting of the exterior of twenty-four (24) windows and three (3) doors in the Sanctuary, Lower Vestry, and Church Office have been completed. The total cost of this project, as approved by the church members at a special church meeting, was \$7,814. This cost included the rental of a lift necessary to access the exterior of the sanctuary windows and front doors.

The National Grid/RISE project to refurbish or replace lighting fixtures with LED components in the Fellowship Hall lower level, stairwell to upper level (north), upper hallway (north), hallway at office, office, lower vestry (all), and exterior lights (all) has been completed. The total cost of this project was \$5,742.

Greenville Baptist Church is very fortunate to have the Hardman/Jamieson Fund in our Diversified Fund to cover the cost of these non-budgeted improvements to our building. The gifts from the estate of Marion Hardman in 2004 and from the estate of Hazel Jamieson in 2006 were combined to form the Hardman/Jamieson Fund. These and other similar gifts are documented in our annual reports.

HURRICANE HARVEY

American Baptists are urged to lift up those affected in both Texas and Louisiana by Hurricane Harvey, a Category 4 storm that made landfall on the Texas coast. Bringing 130 mph winds and an unprecedented amount of torrential rainfall in some areas, the hurricane has resulted in flooding, power outages, downed trees and signs, major property damage, displaced residents, injuries and fatalities.

"American Baptist Home Mission Societies (ABHMS) grieves with rest of the nation at the relentless weather pounding the Houston region right now," says ABHMS Executive Director Dr. Jeffrey Haggray. "Our disaster-recovery office has been in communication with American Baptist Churches of the South since Friday, before the weather hit.

"As soon as we receive damage assessments, we will consider how we can best assist on the long road to rebuilding homes, churches and lives, and then begin distributing relief grants," Haggray continues. "In the meantime, let us all seek comfort in the words of the age-old hymn penned by Martin Luther: 'A might fortress is our God, a bulwark never failing; our helper He, amid the flood of mortal ills prevailing"

50 Years Ago at GBC

It was September, 1967 and Sunday School started on Rally Day with an enthusiastic attendance of about 300 children, plus a staff of 44 teachers and officers. Barbara Brush, Superintendent was requesting more teachers as she felt they should have a staff of at least 60. The Ladies Aid Society made white cherub robes for the Primary

Department. The material was donated by Mr. Richard Illingworth and Mr. Harry Kemp. Rev. George Daniels, Minister of Christian Education and family moved into the church house this month. The Thrift Shop, which was located in the Church House, closed in August so the The Daniels family could move in. A new building for the Thrift Shop is in the planning stage and Carrie Palazzi and Madeline True had high hopes that it would be in operation very soon. (Note: The Thrift Shop is the one that is still being used – the addition was added at a later date.) They say, "What goes around, comes around again." The Thrift Shop is again "Busting at the Seams." And that was how it was in 1967.
